As per our Sunsmart Policy, the students are required to wear their hats outside. Please make sure your child's hat is clearly named.



The Prep/One class also took part in our whole school parade for Book Week. Everyone looked sensational. Here are a few of the characters that came to school.







Run by Australia's Nuclear Science and Technology Organisation (ANSTO), the competition invites students from Grades 3 to 6 from across Australia to submit public awareness posters with a drawing of a shorebird on it.

Aireys Inlet Primary School students have excelled in this year's competition. All the Grade 3 to 6 students took part in it, with 18 of their students' pictures making the first round of judging.

Grade 3 student Oliver and Grade 6 students Mischa, Janahli, and Paige's drawings were highly commended by the competition's judges.

As part of the Shorebirds Competition students started off by learning about the shorebirds native to their region.

"It was a very educational program to start off with, and it was about trying to get the signs out and letting giving a voice to these shorebirds."
